Factors Affecting Vietnam – Japan Relations since the Cold War

Abstract: The cooperative relationship between Vietnam and Japan, which has been interrupted for a period of time since the Cold War, has developed strongly for many reasons, has developed strongly from a normal partner to a "Trusted, Long-term Stable Partner" (April 2002), to a "Strategic Partnership" (April 2009), especially to an "Extensive Strategic Partnership" (March 2014) up to now and presented in many fields. The development of this relationship has been influenced by important external factors as well as internal determinants that need to be thoroughly analyzed and interpreted.

Ten years ago (2013), when being I interviewed by the Vietnamese press, Japanese Ambassador to Vietnam Tanizaki Yasuaki affirmed that: Japan relations developed well in recent times and it is very natural and inevitable for the two countries to upgrade their relationship to become a strategic partnership"4. Ten years have passed, the advancement of Vietnam - Japan relations has further reinforced this statement of Ambassador. Analyzing and explaining the factors affecting the relationship between the two countries post the Cold War (from 1991 to present) is thought to contribute to the process of extensive

research on the relationship between these two political subjects.

1. Context of the world and the Asia-Pacific region

1.1. World context

After the Cold War, many new factors appeared in the world, greatly affecting Vietnam and Japan as well as Vietnam - Japan relations.

Firstly, with the ending of the Cold War and the ending of the Yalta bipolar world order (1989-1991), the gradual determination of the positions of great powers with new foreign strategies along with the impact of other factors, a new world order is gradually forming in the direction of multipolarity, multicenter and that is increasingly taking shape more clearly. The economic factor becomes the decisive factor in the nation's overall strength and the main force in the trend regionalization and globalization. In that new world order, "countries are and will be moving from confrontation to dialogue. detente. normalization. diversification and multilateralization of
